Geriatric Nursing: Best Practices in Caring for the Elderly

TARGET AUDIENCE

This educational activity is designed for registered nurses and other healthcare providers who deliver patient care to geriatric patients.

LEARNING OUTCOME

To increase the participants' knowledge base regarding current evidence-based concepts, information, and practices in the area of geriatric nursing.

OBJECTIVES

At the conclusion of this educational activity the participant will be able to:

1. Describe and demonstrate needs and responses from the 2015 Caregiver study.
2. Identify the top 5 stressors that challenge caregivers.
3. Discuss action plans for caregivers to balance care and health.
4. Explain the mission of the non-profit organization, PACE (Program of All-Inclusive for the Elderly), including the services offered, eligibility requirements and financial eligibility.
5. Describe the evaluation process, behavioral and pharmacologic treatment strategies, and community resources for patients experiencing dementia.
6. Discuss interventions to prevent, recognize, and manage delirium.
7. Review the diagnostic criteria and treatment options for older adults with depression.
8. Identify functions of a palliative care team, patients who would benefit, and how palliative medicine can assist.
9. Differentiate between hospice and palliative care.
10. Discuss different types of Advanced Directives.
11. Identify areas in clinical medicine where new, strong evidence has been uncovered that should affect geriatric practice.
12. Describe the results of a critical appraisal of this evidence.
13. Discuss clinical advances in caring for older adults based on research reported peer reviewed journals January-December 2016.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Today, Americans are living longer and half of all hospital admissions are patients over the age of 65. Nurses caring for the adult population will care for elderly patients, and they must strive to better understand this populations' unique physical and mental health needs which change and become more complex with age. At this program, two expert physicians in geriatric medicine will cover how to differentiate between delirium, dementia, and depression as well as explore the most recent evidence-based geriatric practices. Updates on palliative care and advanced directives will be addressed by a seasoned palliative care nurse and caregiver balance will be addressed by a nationally recognized expert in the field.
